

Bunuru

Perth Festival 9 February → 31 March 2024

Bring students to PICA in Term One to explore interdisciplinary learning, the body and time-based works across four exhibitions. Our Bunuru season of programming is presented in association with Perth Festival whose 2024 theme is *Ngaangk* – Noongar language for Sun/Mother.

TERM 1: Bunuru Program

Joan Jonas (USA): Sun Signals

Explore the boundary-crossing approach of iconic American video and performance artist, Joan Jonas, who has influenced generations of artists since the 1960s. Excursions to Jonas's *Sun Signals* exhibition are a chance to uncover the social, cultural and historical contexts shaping the artist's exploration of time, space, movement and self-representation. Spark conversations with your students about how bodies are represented in different artforms and how performance art is documented and presented in gallery spaces.

<u>Subjects</u>: Visual Arts, Drama, Media Arts, Design, Modern History

Helen Johnson (VIC): Follower, Leader

Consider the potential of painting as both a medium and creative process by unpacking the work of Naarm (Melbourne)-based artist Helen Johnson. Her approach to painting highlights how art can enhance social and emotional wellbeing by creating a space for critical thinking, connection and reflection. Follower, Leader brings together new figurative works shaped by Johnson's experience of motherhood and created while training as an art therapist – a move that has shifted her practice towards conceptions of bodies, care and connection. Build your students' knowledge of the links between arts practices, psychology, health and wellbeing.

AK Burns (USA): Untitled (eclipse)

Draw attention to the materiality of film – its grain, texture and luminosity-while exploring ways of observing and recording natural phenomenon and ecological systems. American artist AK Burns's silent film *Untitled (eclipse)* records a total solar eclipse in the desert landscape of Nebraska with gradations of changing light and windswept vegetation. For this work, Burns worked with 16mm film (opposed to digital video), directly recording traces of sunlight onto its photosensitive surface. This atmospheric work highlights the passage of time and constant flux, connecting with Geography and Environmental Science learning.

<u>Diana Baker Smith (NSW): Falling Towards</u> <u>Another (A Score for the Void)</u>

Explore site-specific art and ways of working across performance, moving image and installation through Diana Baker Smith's Judy Wheeler Commission, Falling Towards Another (A Score for the Void). This work responds to spaces in the PICA building and features a text-based score of performative instructions that invite students to question the role of the audience, consider the history of the site and reflect on how we respond to and move through architectural spaces. The Judy Wheeler Commission is supported by the Simpson Family.

Get physical in PICA's gallery spaces while uncovering insights into interdisciplinary creative practice. Build connections for students across the Arts learning area through a tour of Joan Jonas's Sun Signals exhibition followed by an artist-led workshop with local performer Sarah Nelson that brings together performance, video, drawing and installation. Hands-on, workshop activities will focus on developing student knowledge and skills to devise visual and physical performance and create interactive design that responds to space. This workshop builds on the learning experiences provided in the exhibition tour and encourages students to explore the gallery as a stage, encountering different techniques of communicating meaning through movement, material and form. Sarah Nelson is an actor, puppeteer, mask maker and physical performer working across theatre, film and community arts.

Before you get here: Context and Creative Challenges

Prepare students in-class for an excursion to Joan Jonas's *Sun Signals*. Explore the social, cultural and historical contexts of the 1960-70s that shaped Jonas's exploration of time, space and self-representation. Set creative challenges and spark conversations about how bodies are represented and performance is presented in gallery spaces.

<u>During your visit: Analysing and Responding to Time-based Art</u>

Once at PICA students can use provided worksheets with prompts and questions that guide their interpretation and cover topics of movement, time, space and materiality.

After your visit: Mind and Body in the Moment

Following your class visit to PICA, activity sheets are available to help students reflect on and creatively respond to their exhibition experience. Exercises explore the creative process, mindfulness in action and self-awareness.

PICA Art Talks video: Diana Baker Smith

Once back in class, hear from artist Diana Baker Smith in a video interview that extends the learnings gained from an excursion to PICA. Focusing on the artist's voice and experience, this video interview covers interdisciplinary practice and key concepts in dance, design and visual art.

TERM 2: Djeran/Makuru

17 April → 23 June 2024

Broaden students' horizons in Term Two with time-based works spanning contemporary art, dance and performance. Through three live performances, learn about movement techniques, the importance of collaboration and the art of documenting the body in action. This program opens discussion about body positivity, self-acceptance and healthy active lifestyles.

Make Your Life Count: Sarah Aiken (VIC) Wednesday 17 → Saturday 20 April 2024 Live performance

Inspire students with an ambitious new solo dance work that connects with Science and Technologies. In Make Your Life Count, choreographer and dancer Sarah grapples with the paradoxes of modern life by employing the body and technology. Shifting scale in a heartbeat - from the microscopic to the universal - this perspective-shifting work explores humanity, ecology, time and the universe. Q&A sessions with the artist provides insights for students into devising performance and the elements of dance, choreographic devices and principles of design. Discounted tickets are available for school groups. Students and educators can also register for free tickets as part of our pay-it-forward system to increase access for communities experiencing financial barriers.

Performance-Exhibition

Question students about what it means 'to perform' and 'to exhibit' by engaging with a dynamic new work that sees eight dancers perform in constant dialogue with various objects throughout PICA's central galleries during opening hours. WHEN I AM NOT THERE is a performance-exhibition by Naarm (Melbourne)-based artist Shelley Lasica, who has experimented with choreography and dance for over four decades. In this live work choreography, costumes, paintings, sculpture, videos, texts and soundscapes are presented from her archive of works. Often made in close collaboration with visual artists, composers, designers, architects and writers, Lasica's work has been presented in varied contexts - from galleries and museums to theatres, outdoor spaces, nightclubs and sports halls. Explore the relationship between dance and space, and the ways choreography interacts with other artistic disciplines. Expose students to a new exhibition format that will spark conversations about interdisciplinary learning and collaboration. Additionally, the inclusive and diverse range of performers present in the work opens discussion about body positivity, selfacceptance and healthy active lifestyles.

Don't miss this rare opportunity to link elements of dance, drama and visual art in a combined morning and afternoon program for schools across WA's premier arts organisations, PICA and the Art Gallery of Western Australia.

For a limited two-week period, students are invited to explore the different ways bodies are represented in contemporary art, with particular attention to portraiture and performance. Morning and afternoon sessions run in parallel across the two cultural institutions, providing extended-learning experiences focused on the body, identity and emotion.

The ways bodies interact with space and objects is explored in Shelley Lasica's performance-exhibition *WHEN I AM NOT THERE* at PICA, which sees eight dancers interacting with paintings, sculpture, videos, texts and soundscapes in the gallery.

Students' experiences of the work are built upon with two artist-led workshops focused on developing their knowledge across the arts in choregraphing movement, devising performance and documenting the body in action. One workshop focuses on movement and is led by performers from STRUT Dance and the other explores the documentation of performance led by Jacqui Shelton, an artist, film-maker and collaborator with Lasica.

Make the most of your excursion to PICA by connecting student learning to *The West Australian Pulse* exhibition at AGWA. This exhibition showcases a selection of works by Year 12 Visual Arts students, providing a window into the concerns of young people and casting a light on how representations of bodies relate to mental health, social pressures, gender and culture.

Artist video: Shelley Lasica

TERM 3: Djilba Exhibitions

Hatched National Graduate Show 2024

Held annually, *Hatched* is a calendar highlight for students and educators keen to get a glimpse into the future of arts practice in Australia. Since 1992, *Hatched* has exhibited the work of over 1,400 art school graduates, with notable alumni including Archie Moore (Venice Biennale 2024), Julie Gough (Biennale of Sydney 2022) and Ramesh Mario Nithiyendran (Melbourne Art Foundation Young Artist Award 2018). For most of these artists, *Hatched* is their first experience exhibiting at a major public institution.

The artists in *Hatched* address some of the most compelling issues of our time in media including painting, sculpture, photography, installation, video and various experimental forms. The culmination of years of studio and research-based enquiry, their works represent a diversity of innovation, materiality, technique and perspective.

The only exhibition of its kind in Australia, *Hatched* platforms the artists' works to a national audience and connects them with their peers from across the country. It is accompanied by an exhibition catalogue and bespoke professional development program designed to assist the artists in furthering their artistic careers.

Year 11 students in the Visual Arts ATAR and general courses are invited to hear from *Hatched* artists-in-residence about their artistic journey. Hands-on-activities will help students prepare for their year 12 assessments by covering creative thinking and working processes. This includes tips on linking authentic experiences to broader social, cultural and political contexts; research approaches; material experimentation; documentation; and developing effective artist statements. This master class is led by local and interstate *Hatched* artists and PICA staff.

Get creative at PICA during National Science Week with hands-on interdisciplinary learning and STEAM education. Explore how the graduating Australian artists in the Hatched exhibition address compelling issues such as sustainability through an exhibition tour. Then dive into the National Science Week's school theme - Species Survival: More Than Just Sustainability - through workshops about the effects of microplastics on migratory birds. Connecting the scientific method with creative expression, this workshop is led by bird conservation specialist, Dr Lindall Kidd, and artist and Hatched alumni Stephanie De Biasi. Learn about the high-tech tools and methods used to track the journey of bird species and protect them from habitat loss and other threats. Creatively respond by making sculptures out of recycled plastics to add to an interactive installation inspired by birds journeying from our shores across the world, such as the Eastern Curlew and Bar-Tailed Godwit.
