POSITION PURPOSE

PICA's Curator supports the organisation's strategic priorities by developing and delivering a visual arts program that reflects its values. This is a key leadership position within the organisation, working closely with the Director and programming team to further the depth, breadth and impact of PICA's creative program. This is a senior management role, responsible for the delivery of PICA's visuals art program, managing a small team, working within budget, in a timely manner and at the highest standards. PICA's Curator is responsible for supporting and advocating for artists, delivering meaningful art experiences and attracting ongoing and new audiences. PICA's Curator works closely with artists, galleries and the broader contemporary art sector in Australia and internationally. PICA's success is built on its relationships and collaborations, and the Curator plays a critical role in connecting the organisation with likeminded peers, seeking partnerships and maintaining positive working relationships within the sector.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Programming

Work with the Director and programming team to develop annual programs that create high quality artistic experiences that:

- reflect the breadth and innovations of contemporary arts practices and offer impactful outcomes for artists and audiences
- develop future focused arts practitioners and artistic practices
- expand the relevance and reach of contemporary arts experiences
- support the organisation's mission of creating career-defining moments for artists, life changing experiences for audiences and critical turning points in the advancement of art forms

Assume responsibility for rigorous forward planning across all visual arts programs to ensure appropriate resourcing, realistic lead-times and high-quality outcomes.

2. Delivery

Lead the implementation of PICA's visual arts programs within budget and timeframes, including:

research, concept development, design and production of exhibitions and related PICA projects

- engage and commission artists, guest curators and writers as well as liaising with lenders, including preparation and coordination of loan requests and artist agreements
- prepare and manage PICA's annual visual arts program budget, working with the Director, General Manager and Exhibition Manager to develop annual and project budgets, and actively tracking expenditure
- effectively manage PICA's Exhibitions Manager, Hatched Curatorial Fellow, Installation Coordinator, guest curators and other contractors towards the timely delivery of PICA exhibitions, working with the highest professional standards and ensuring that systems are in place to support artists
- work with the Learning & Access Manager and Public Program & Studio Manager to plan and deliver public, education and access programs, including symposia, public lectures, talks and workshops
- work with PICA's Communications team to coordinate audience development strategies, marketing and publicity for exhibitions, including exhibition texts, labels, media releases and media interviews
- work with the Development Manager to identify opportunities to support and maximise stakeholder engagement and sponsorship opportunities
- contribute to the planning, scheduling and delivery of exhibition events, such as openings, as required
- coordinate the timely delivery of appropriate documentation for each exhibition or project, including the production of videos from time to time

3. Evaluation

- Provide high level authoritative advice, informed analysis and suggested actions to achieve PICA's vision, strategic goals and KPIs in relation to programming
- Assist in the development of evaluation frameworks (including artist and audience surveys and assessment) for PICA's visual arts program
- Contribute to processes to collect, analyse and report upon key performance indicators (KPIs) of the visual arts program (including attendance figures and artist and audience feedback)
- Undertake regular program evaluation and monitoring, including surveys, feedback, photographic permissions, attendance data, statistics and reports, to ensure PICA's visual arts program are relevant, engaging and responsive

4. Stakeholders

- Engage with PICA's First Nations Advisory Group and Artist Advisory Group, as required
- Develop and maintain key partnerships with local and international curatorial institutions, professional associations, committees and art industry colleagues, including First Nations networks, and generally contribute to a culture of research, learning, cultural engagement, discussion and debate
- Develop and maintain professional networks and audiences for PICA's activities through responding to public inquiries, liaising with external stakeholders, assisting with public events and openings, presenting lectures, floor talks and guided tours
- Contribute to the supervision and development of staff, including managing performance and professional development of exhibitions staff, interns and volunteers
- Assist with hosting visiting artists and curators

5. Other

- Proactively identify and seek funding opportunities and partnerships in support of PICA's programs, including preparation of funding applications (and acquittals) and provision of clear and timely program content for sponsorship proposals
- Oversee the maintenance and presentation of exhibition and studio spaces with the support of the Exhibition Manager, Public Program & Studio Manager and Operations Manager
- Develop and regularly review policies to effectively ensure the integrity and security of PICA's procedures and that best practice standards are adhered to throughout the organisation

- Where relevant, ensure that PICA meets its legal, compliance and reporting responsibilities including in WHS, Contracts, Agreements, Copy/ Moral/ Indigenous Cultural and Intellectual Property Rights and Insurance, along with its Inclusivity and Sustainability goals.
- Adhere to PICA's WHS policies and other relevant policies and processes
- Other duties as directed from time to time

Selection Criteria

- 5-10 years' experience in curating or coordinating contemporary visual art exhibitions in galleries or museums.
- In depth knowledge of Australian art history and contemporary practices, including First Nations art and culture, artists and institutions, curatorial theory and practice and a broad knowledge of international contemporary art and issues.
- Excellent planning and organisational skills at both a strategic and operational level, with a proven record of successfully managing all aspects of medium-to-large projects through to completion in accordance with agreed standards, timeframes and budgets.
- Excellent relationship management skills, including demonstrated experience in leading and motivating a diverse, high-performing team to achieve agreed goals, including casual staff, interns and contractors.
- Excellent problem-solving skills, including the ability to devise practical solutions to complex issues and create a supportive environment for artists and creative teams.
- Outstanding written and oral communication skills, including researching and writing about contemporary visual art for a variety of audiences, delivering presentations in a range of contexts, and general editing and proofing.
- Effective computer skills, including Microsoft Office suite, image editing, website and socials.
- Postgraduate qualification or progress towards a postgraduate qualification in art history, curatorial or museum studies, or another relevant discipline.
